These are some of the most popular. Do a web search to find more. Their primary purpose is to keep the kids interested and participating during the long evening before the meal.

Tonight is a time for questioning and teaching the next generations. An old Jewish story tells the story of 4 sons, each of whom have different ideas about Passover. We have changed the words a bit and put it in the form of a song.

And the father proudly answered, "As our people ate in speed ate the Pascal lamb near midnight and from slavery were freed.

So we follow their example and by midnight must complete, all the Seder and we should not after twelve remain to eat.

Then did sneer the son so wicked "What does all this mean to you?" And the father's voice was bitter, As his grief and anger grew.

"If yourself you don't consider As a son of Yis ra el, Then for you this has no meaning, You could be a slave as well."

Then the simple son said softly, "What is this" and quietly the good father told his offspring "We were freed from slavery."

But the youngest son was silent, He could barely speak at all. His young eyes were bright with wonder, as his father told them all.

Now dear children, heed the lesson and remember evermore. What the father told his children. Told his sons that numbered four.

The song "Go Down Moses" tells of Moses' plea to the Pharaoh to free his people. The song "Go Down Moses" has stimulated the writing creativity of many generations. While the first 2 verses are traditional, succeeding verses are often very different. The slaves of America often sang their own variations of this song. Please join in singing this variation.

One of the traditional songs of Passover, "Diayenu," gives thanks for each step along the road to freedom in the promised land.

We sing "It would have been enough" to have been freed from slavery, even if nothing more was given.

We can sing Dayenu to celebrate each step we take toward liberation as if it were enough, and then start out on the next step. We say today that all these gifts are not enough unless we apply the lessons to our daily lives. The freedom struggle continues and there are many wrongs we must right before we can be fully satisfied.

It is not enough for us to end slavery and build happy lives for ourselves while others are oppressed. It is not enough for us to celebrate our dignity if we allow intolerance to harm others.

As Hillel suggests, "If we are only for ourselves, who are we?".

It is not enough to stop when we are satisfied with our own lives. We can, and should, continue to discuss our level of responsibility to help others in need.

Everyone join in song. (We will sing just the Chorus - There are many variations of tongue twisting verses.)

CHAD GAHD YA - (a traditional Passover parable song)

Passover is the festival of life and Jewish survival. Against the fury of many foes the Jewish people have survived. No enemy can stamp out a tradition and history that is so resilient.

CHAD GAHD YA is a metaphor for the name of the little goat of Israel which others have sought to devour.

But in the end, they themselves have been devoured. (each verse is sung a little faster than the one before - start out slow)
